Dear Employees, Families and Friends of Ability Works,

Last month I mentioned we were winners of the Social Traders Game Changer VIC/TAS Award for 2022. This has now put us in the running for the



National award. I am being flown to
Brisbane to represent Ability Works to attend
the Social Enterprise World Forum, where the
national winner will be announced on
Thursday 29th September. Fingers crossed!
We seem to be on an award-winning streak
at present. We were nominated (we don't
know by whom) for an Enablement Award
and have won for "The most outstanding
support of people with significant barriers to
employment". The award was held by the
NDIS Update media platform to celebrate
and reward excellence in innovation and



exemplary achievements in the disability sector. Kannan and Anu represented us and accepted the award.

Aurecon have requested I join them in Sydney on October 13th, as their guest at the Australian Financial Review (AFR) / Boss Most Innovative Company award, for the significant role Ability Works played in the Accessible Melbourne Tram Stop project. They hope to rank highly in this year's list. Congratulations to all Ability Works employees who provided consulting advice to Aurecon on this project. The advice provided quality insights into Inclusive Design, which have placed Aurecon in a position of strength. We have applied to the Department of Families, Fairness and Housing (DFFH) Vic for a ½ million-dollar Universal Design Grant to

men's and ladies toilets accessible. If there are funds left over, we will be able to replace our 50 year old lift with a larger one, and renovate the staircase to the downstairs factory. The decision on what we renovate, was based on the results of a survey that was sent to all employees, families and carers.

Prior to acquiring a new facility in Dandenong, we plan to co-design the facility with potential employees who live in Dandenong, to ensure we cater to their needs. We now have the funding we need to complete that research. We have received \$25k from Jobsbank and a further \$50k from the Westpac Foundation. RMIT University will be conducting the research with the communities who face the most barriers to employment in Dandenong.

On Wednesday 21st September we had a visit by the Hon. Michael Sukkar (Federal Liberal member for Deakin, & Assistant Shadow Treasurer), as part of our government engagement

program. He was very impressed with our work and asked us to contact him should we need his support.

Human Centred Innovations presents - Matilda

Sue Boyce recently presented at a forum organised by Professor Rajiv Khosla (left), the creator of our robot Matilda, to discuss how we use Matilda at Ability Works. The presentation was also attended by Tasmanian Senator Helen Polley (pictured), who talked about MATILDA® in her speech in Parliament.

The session discussed how MATILDA® uses Artificial Intelligence, and has been revolutionising education, jobs and independent living for Australians with autism and other intellectual disabilities over the last five years.

Matilda (our nickname for MATILDA®) has helped over 1500 children with autism in early childcare and school settings with its Robot Autism Behaviour Intervention (RABI) program and has been developed to empower them with social, behavioral, and communication skills. Matilda has been proven to reduce a child's autism severity, emotional and financial burdens, problem behaviours, stress and workload while promoting a child's communication and social skills. A recent study found two adults with autism interacted with MATILDA® for more than 150 hours in a home-based support setting resulting in respite for their parents over nine months.

At Ability Works, Matilda has been working with Ability Works employees. Together with Matilda, we have been able to create seven additional jobs on the Transurban project by carving jobs into component parts and Matilda helping anyone with literacy challenges to work on the account by reading for them.



Creator of MATILDA® Professor Rajiv Khosla says the key barrier to people with intellectual disabilities having access to MATILDA®, is a lack of funding for the robot. He says tens of thousands more people with intellectual disabilities and their parents could benefit if more funding was provided.

Enablement Awards 2022

On 8th September 2022 Ability Works was a winner at the **Enablement Awards 2022** in the category "The most outstanding support of People with Significant Barriers to Employment". The awards were held by the NDIS Update media platform to celebrate and reward excellence, innovation, and exemplary achievements in the disability care sector.

We were nominated by an unknown nominee for our continual creation of employment opportunities within our Digital Service business unit whereby we employed 25+ people who were facing barriers to employment. We have also gone a step

further and provided permanent positions to two people who worked in the Digital Service business unit.



Central Melbourne Mobility Map Trial

The Victorian Department of Transport is presently undertaking a pilot of a Central Melbourne Mobility Map. The map is to assist people with mobility aids (wheelchairs, motorised scooters, walkers, canes) to navigate the Arts, Entertainment and Sports precinct.

A map has been created which help rate the ease-of-use of various paths and walkways, as well as the accessibility facilities of toilets and local public transport.

Mark Golotta joined Natalie for an initial briefing with department representatives, who showed how the map worked and people were able to share their initial thoughts and suggestions. There is now a survey available for anyone to complete after trialling the map.

The survey is open to anyone to complete and will remain open until 31 October 2022.





Understanding Stages of Grief and Loss when Life Changes

Many people associate grief primarily with death and loss of significant relationships and things. During the past few years of extraordinary change, many freedoms have been denied, daily activities banned and isolation from others became a lifesaving necessity. More recently, the world experienced other changes, like the death of Queen Elizabeth II. Becoming familiar with the process of grief may be useful in helping make sense of uncharacteristic behaviour, when things unexpectedly change.

The Five Stages of Grief - a theory developed by psychiatrist, Elisabeth Kübler-Ross, in 1969, is a useful model to help break down the way in which we deal with the grief and loss experience, and how it may relate to how you and others cope during such periods. - Rae Bonney

Kübler-Ross Grief Curve



STAGE ONE: DENIAL

Managing our emotions through

denial allows us time to adjust to distressing situations, however, staying in this stage can interfere with our ability to be resilient and manage challenges.

STAGE TWO: ANGER

When human beings feel helpless,

are denied freedom and/or have control taken away, anger is a very natural, emotional response.

STAGE THREE: BARGAINING

We can feel more animated and hopeful

during the bargaining stage – feeling almost excited about making plans for when the challenging moment passes - and taking a rest from challenging emotions.

STAGE FOUR: **DEPRESSION** Coming down from the heightened

feelings of anger and bargaining, can leave us experiencing unexpected sadness and dejection – this is a sign of moving into the depression stage. During this time, it can be tempting to withdraw completely and want to block out the reality of life.

STAGE FIVE: ACCEPTANCE

The stage of acceptance does not indicate the completion of our journey, more likely,


we now understand and accept the situation as it is.

Ways to Stay Healthy and Safe

- ♥ It's quite normal for all the stages of grief to emerge multiple times in different sequences, so when you are feeling discombobulated and out of sorts, check in with the grief curve and see where you're at.
- Try to resist abandoning your daily plan/ routine and allow yourself permission to be sad for very good reason.
- It's important to not judge yourself and others too harshly when you are feeling angry. Be patient, kind and understanding, as these moments will pass as we adapt and adjust to our changing circumstances.
- Bottling up emotions can have a detrimental effect on physical and mental health. Staying in regular contact with personal and professional support/people you trust, can help keep perspective and balance.
- Work is a wonderful antidote for when we are feeling upset, as it gives us purpose and meaning. Now and every day is a time for offering empathy and understanding, recognising everyone experiences grief and loss differently.

"Denial helps us to pace our feelings of grief. There is a grace in denial. It is nature's way of letting in only as much as we can handle".



COOKING WITH JIMMY Creamy Mushroom

and Garlic Soup

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 brown onions
- 2 medium potatoes
- 1 thick leek stem
- 6 cloves of garlic
- 5g dried Porchini mushrooms
- 5g dried Shitake mushrooms
- 750g Button mushrooms
- · 140g unsalted butter • 50ml white wine
- 1 litre of vegetable or chicken stock
- 100ml cream • 40ml of milk

PREPARATION:

Roast dried mushrooms for 5 minutes at 150°C then grind them in spice grinder, put aside. Roughly chop up the onions and potatoes. lalve the leek stem horizontally, then vertically - thinly slice. Crush and roughly chop the of garlic. Slice the mushrooms into slices.

COOKING:

Place the butter in deep sided pot. Sauté onions and potatoes with a pinch of salt for 7 minutes. Add leek, garlic and button mushrooms, sauté for 12 minutes. Add white wine and reduce for 2 minutes. Add vegetable or chicken stock, cream, milk and salt and pepper to taste and simmer for 10 minutes. Turn heat off and use a stick blender to blend the chunky bits smooth.

Garnish with the mushroom powder, cracked black pepper, truffle oil (optional) and serve with buttered quality toast.

Also I would like to thank the Committee members for their enthusiasm, dedication and eagerness to make this a safer place to work.

Stair Safety

Recently an issue has been brought to the **OH&S Committee's** attention that occasionally people congregate on the stairs. The stairs should be used for moving from one area to the next. It is OK to momentarily stop on the stairs to let another member pass however straight after they do so it is important to continue walking and not to stop for a chat. This process ensures that the stairs are available for other members to use safely and congestion is kept to a minimum.

OBSERVE THE SPEED LIMIT

The Speed Limit on the Royal Talbot Site is 10.

We are on a hospital site where there are many patients ie. amputees, ABI patients, mobility limitations, patients in wheel chairs, as well as our employees (not to mention medical staff and our own staff who also use the roads). A number of people have been caught doing up to 60 kms an hour on the roadway and not understanding that this is very dangerous on this road. This kind of speed limit over the signed speed limit is enough to lose your licence.

Mark's Story

We are grateful to Mark Golotta who recently told his story, together with Sue, when they were invited to do a podcast for Jobsbank. Jobsbank is a semi-government funded organisation that encourages inclusive employment. Mark talked about how he started off his career as a welder. Within a couple of weeks of getting his qualifications, he

was involved in a collision while on his motorbike, when a car made an inappropriate U turn. The accident left Mark with paraplegia and after several months in recovery he tried to get back into welding.

This proved challenging as mainstream employers did not have the right supports for him to weld in his wheelchair. He eventually found Ability Works and whilst he still does welding occasionally, has worked his way up to be a Team Leader on the Transurban account. Thanks, Mark, for telling your story. It has facilitated to promote how Ability Works can help get people into employment.
